You should be prepared to show how you have considered the Committee's input before you move forward to Council.

• If you plan to do any fundraising beyond the troop, your family or the beneficiary, you must complete the fundraising application section of the workbook. Remember to read the application and the instructions in their entirety and discuss the contents with your parents and/or coach. Do not submit a proposal without an idea about how you will finance the project. If you mention fundraising outside the troop, your family or the beneficiary in your proposal, then include a completed Fundraising Application. Including this will ensure that the

- Once you are ready to approach Council, you should have a very good idea of the scope of your project, expertise needed, and funding. The Council representative will appreciate a well thought out workbook and prepared scout. He may meet you at the site to discuss the project. Please communicate with him freely. In fact, over communicate with him. Electronic mail is fine, but also try to call him periodically so that you are all in sync on the project, the timeline and other things. Make sure you include him on your work day planning and invite him.
- The <u>Eagle Scout Service Project Plan</u> should provide a good deal of detail for your project. This is the last look before you leap into your work days. Documenting the work to be done at this stage will trigger ideas and forgotten items. Consider this a practice run for the first day.
 - Once you have finished your project, complete the <u>Eagle Service Project Report</u> in the workbook <u>before</u> you forget all the great details and learning you gained from the leadership experience. It is not a bad idea to keep notes each day to include in your report.

Good luck to you as you work toward the Rank of Eagle. Consider me, the ASMs, and the Committee as resources for this project. Do not hesitate to call upon us for assistance and guidance. In return, we expect that you will be considerate of our time and commitments and allow sufficient opportunity for thoughtful review and comment.
