In addition to these demonstrations there were displays from the US Merchant Marine Academy, Ramsey Outdoor, Fur Trappers of NJ, Kittatiny Canoe Trips and several others.

The Northern New Jersey Council had a Trading post set up and there were many patches and other items that could be purchased commemorating the Camporee and the National Jamboree. This was in addition to the commemorative patch and t shirt each attendee received as part of the registration.

We had a number of our adult leaders helping out in several places during the day. Mr. Dente and Mr. Burns worked in the Signaling Merit Badge area all day and helped move through a few hundred scouts. Mr. Kozak after finding some confusion on where different activities were found some dry erase pens and adjusted the master Camporee map and stationed himself as the official information center which was much appreciated by our scouts and a significant number of units in attendance. We had lunch in our site and the boys then went back out to complete more of the activities. Congratulations to several of our scouts are in order as Padraic Burns and Matthew Richards came in first place in the orienteering competition and brought the troop "the coveted silver ribbon". The Whittles showed true Scottish form at the Highland Games and led Troop 49 to Two 3rd place finishes in the Kaber Toss and heavy stone throw.

After a very full day of activity the troop returned to camp for dinner and some downtime before the evening show and closing ceremony. Many of the boys instead of taking advantage of the downtime decided to climb the ski slopes to get a look at the view from the top and many of them proceeded to roll down the hill. Mr. Folkerts and I walked up the hill to take some pictures and it was quite a view. We chose not to roll back down the hill but got some great pictures of the boys and the overall camp!

After dinner was all cleaned up and put away we lined up to head over to the evening show. A great stage and screen was set up and the show started with slide shows from the summer camps and then we were treated to Eagle Scout Mike Rowe's (from the TV show Dirty Jobs) Keynote Speech from the recent National Jamboree. That was truly a great story about how a shy kid from Baltimore learned how to overcome that shyness and become willing to try many new things because of the Boy Scouts of America.

Following a performance by the OA Dance team on the stage we were treated to an amazing rock n roll laser light show that both the boys and adults equally enjoyed. It was a great mix of classic rock and modern music that we all enjoyed. The final ceremony of the evening was the lighting of candles from three candles representing the Weboree, The National Jamboree, and the World Jamboree. Once all of the participants candles were lit there was a playing of Taps by three Troop Buglers, one of which was our own Patrick Dente. Congratulations to Patrick for doing a great job in front of 2,000 people. At the conclusion of Taps the candles were extinguished and everyone headed back to camp for the night.

On Sunday morning many members of the Troop stayed for the final closing and then we headed back home.
